

Synopsis of the history of Herculena Temple No. 27, completely wiped out all the possessions and paraphernalia, 81:

Herculena Temple was chartered December 14, 1900, with 19 Sisters and 11 Knights as Charter Members. All the charter members are now deceased. Herculena still has in its possession the original Roster started at the time of the Herculena supported Campfire Girls, giving camperships, the institution. Grand Chief's Project: Doernbecher's Child Life Department

In their own words, Child Life therapists at Doernbecher Children's Hospital use play, recreation, education, self-expression, and child development research to promote psychological well being and healthy growth of children, adolescents, and their families.

By educating children about what will happen, Child Life Specialists take away much of their fear, stress and anxiety. This helps normalize an otherwise abnormal time.

Child Life Therapy strives to accomplish this goal through a variety of ways:

- * Pre-procedural teaching
- * Medical play therapy
- * Playroom and arts and crafts activities
- * Socializing
- * Distraction during procedures
- * Special events and entertainment

Professionally trained Child Life Specialists have the expertise to answer children's questions according to their developmental level. From little ones to teenagers, and their siblings are included as well. Child Life Specialists determine what is typically most stressful for each child, in order to determine what level of explanation is appropriate and how far in advance the child can process that information. The Child Life Specialists help parents learn how to alleviate stress for the whole family.

Not only does this Department help families, but they also train hospital staff to help the medical team better understand how to help children through the difficulties of a hospital stay. Topics include how to position children for comfort during procedures and how to explain hospital routines by using language that children can understand and learn from.

A Child Life Specialist must have a degree in child development, human development, early childhood education, psychology, or a related field. He or she must complete internship and practicum study and then pass a
